	Read a sentence. Ask children to write on whiteboards. Encourage children to sound talk tricky words. My nephew said the alphabet. Will a dolphin whisper so

Jigsaw	Goals and Dreams - Puzzle piece 4. (Tackling a new challenge and stretching our learning.
	Ask your child to stand up and stretch as high as they can, standing on tiptoes. Repeat with stretching in different directions. Conclude that our bodies are
	very stretchy. Can you think of anything that is stretchier? E.g. elastic band, caterpillar.
	Briefly explain that when we learn new things we have to stretch our thinking skills. This usually means trying over and over again, and stretching a bit more and
	a bit more.
	Activity: Make a 'stretchy' flower with your child.
	1. Make a hand print or draw around hand. 2. Cut out your hand print/flower. 3. Decorate it to make it look like a flower. 4. Fix the hand to one end of
	a pipecleaner, threading the pipecleaner through the hand so it sits on top like a flower. 5. Attach the other end of the pipe cleaner to a garden stick
	by winding it around the top.
	Reflect: How does your child feel now that they have succeeded in making their stretchy flower?
RE	Question: How can people show that they are following Jesus?
	Activity: Show your child a 'good news' photo of a Christian project to help homeless people: for example, from Leeds, where St George's Crypt has been helping
	homeless people for 85 years. Their website tells the story. https://www.stgeorgescrypt.org.uk
	Ask pupils to work out what is going on, and suggest whether this might be a 'good news' picture. Who for? Is it a good example of people following Jesus? In
	what way? What might Jesus say or do if he visited St George's Crypt?

Science	Which Materials Float and Sink?
	In this lesson, we will be investigating different materials and their properties. We will be exploring which materials float and which materials sink, then we will
	be making comparisons while looking at their properties. Do all hard materials sink? Do all soft materials float?
	Watch the video above for an introduction to floating and sinking. If you would like to carry out your own experiment at home, an investigation sheet has been
	assigned on PurpleMash to record your findings.
History	Timeline of Toys - Watch: 100 Years of Toys
	Some toys have been played with for hundreds of years, like cards or dolls. However, toys are always changing as fashion and technology change and new toys
	are invented. To show how toys have changed through the decades historians use what is called a 'timeline'. Can you create your own Toys timeline by putting
	toys in chronological order by the date that they were created? Task assigned on PurpleMash.

Recycling Art: Collage
Create a beautiful piece of artwork using old magazines, newspapers, or old paper from around the house. This could be food wrapping, spare wallpaper, gift
wrapping - in fact, any materials you think could be torn into little pieces and used in the collage
First, select an image that you wish to create in the style of a collage. You might light to create an animal, insect, cartoon character, real person, or a landscape
scene.
Draw an outline of the image you wish to turn into a collage or use a template.
Tear small pieces of paper from your magazines, newspapers or old paper and glue them onto your image. Tip: choose coloured images from your recycled paper
that fit the colour you want in that section of the collage. For example, if you were doing a red apple, use all the pictures and paper with shades of red on to tear and glue onto your collage. Continue to tear and glue bits of paper onto your image until it is complete.
